## **CHAIRS REPORT**



#### **PADEAP Uganda**

PADEAP Uganda opened in 1997. Our programmes are channelled towards using the driving forces of advocacy and education to empower African voices for development in Uganda and the wider East African Community (EAC) and African Union.

#### Community resource centre - Kampala

PADEAP Uganda's community resource centre is a hub for providing information, training and education. We have built up an extensive library of information as a resource for local refugees and community based organisations working with refugees. The library holds books, journals, newspapers and literature that focus on issues related to Pan African approaches to development, refugee rights, human rights, youth, gender empowerment, conflict, health and ICT. The centre is open to all in the local community who require access to the internet for educational and information.

#### Citizenship Programme

In partnership with Global Pan African Movement, the International Refugee Rights initiative and the Open society Justice Initiative the Citizenship Rights in Africa Initiative (CRAI) was launched in 2007. CRAI is a campaign dedicated to ending statelessness and the arbitrary denial of citizenship in Africa.

#### Refugee Advocacy programme (RAP)

Uganda has a refugee population of 257,273 people (UNNCR 2007), 65% being women and girls. Uganda has 9 Government gazetted refugee settlements scattered all over the country.

RAP works with refugees and asylum seekers in Kampala and the Nakivale refugee settlement. During 2009 we have deepened and consolidated the range of services offered to the refugees living within Kampala.

#### PADEAP Nigeria

PADEAP Nigeria opened in 2003 and is committed to the development of the rural communities especially in the northwest zone of Nigeria, based on the ideology of using education as a catalyst for change. Our programmes are channelled towards using the driving forces of advocacy and education to empower African voices for development in the zone.

#### Community resource centre - Funtua

PADEAP's community resource centre is an open place for easy interaction among people from diverse cultural, religious and ethnic backgrounds. It is also a hub for providing information, training and education. Its library is designed to meet needs of all categories of groups within the community especially young people and women. It holds a vast array of books, journals, newspapers, and literature that focus on Pan-African approaches to issues of conflict, human rights, health, youth, gender, politics and Information & Communication Technology.

#### **Women's Community Education Programme**

PADEAP has played a central role in supporting the development of women and women led groups in the Funtua senatorial zone of Katsina State. Working in a conservative part of Nigeria, it has been difficult to offer services to women of all faiths, but in working with local leaders and community members, the Community Education Programme has grown.

PADEAP is registered with the Mass Education Department – Katsina State and is a Continous Education Provider for Katsina State. We offer basic, post and Continous education classes (Secondary school level) for Adult women.

#### Peace Building (conflict resolution and interfaith programmes)

In 2008 PADEAP incorporated the successful UNICEF and Uganda Youth Anti-Aids Association (UYAAS) participatory peer education programme into their work. The 10-week programme incorporates peer educator training in schools for peace building, reproductive Health, HIV/Aids and Human Rights including the Millennium Development Goals. Teachers believed the peer educators should incorporate issues diresctly affecting the local community. Also focusing on health related areas would bring all sides of the community together, as HIV/Aids can affect anyone regardless of ethnicity or religious beliefs. Statistics show that in Northwest Nigeria, more than 80 percent of secondary school students exhibit complete ignorance of HIV/AIDS. 812 peer educators have been trained in 20 schools within Katsina State. 16,232 pupils directly benefited from the peer education programme, through school assemblies, and contact with trained peer educators.
